About Bridge NSW

The first day of June marked the official completion of the separation of the state peak body functions (Bridge NSW) from the bridge centre (now the Sydney Bridge Club).

The member clubs control the entity through the Council. The Council, in turn, appoints a Board to undertake all the functions of Bridge NSW. The initial Board and Council were selected as part of the creation process. The first election of a Council will occur later this year.

Introduction to Bridge NSW

The Council had its first operative meeting on 7 August via video conference. Somebody (the EO) was meant to take a screenshot of the meeting. That somebody forgot.

The Chairs of the five committees (People & Governance, Events, Education, Clubs & Community and Youth) presented on their work to the meeting.

We'll get each committee to update members on their activity in future issues.

The Clubs & Community Committee has commenced recruiting for two teams. The Clubs and Community Engagement team is designed to increase the connection between clubs and between clubs and the state body. The Club Support Team is planned to have people skilled in all aspects of club operation to be called on as needed.

Education Committee Surveys

The Education Committee is one of five committees established by the Board of Bridge NSW. The Terms of Reference for the committee include:

- Provide Teachers with support and materials for successfully delivering the Bridge NSW curriculum.
- Establish pathways for learners and clubs to progress player skill levels and event participation.
- Support Directors with training and materials for skills and accreditation progression.
- Provide input on strategic direction, leadership, and expertise about all areas of education for directors, teachers and players.

To identify what support would be most valuable to clubs, teachers, and directors, the committee recently sent a survey to all clubs and two other surveys asking that they be forwarded to teachers and directors.

The response rate has been very good, and we will publish some insights from the survey results in the next newsletter issue. Before we do, we want to ensure the survey reaches as wide an audience as possible.



These areas have grown mostly since card playing became a less common pastime. But there surely must be plenty of potential bridge players – and clubs – in this vast area.



Once in a Lifetime ??

Coffs Harbour Bridge Club -1 June 2024.

You are South and the dealer. As you pick up your cards, you note that you are vulnerable. You add up your points three times, and the total is 32 HCPs each time!!



What to do? You open 24; your partner replies 24. Now what? That afternoon, Phil Houlton was the only person to bid a slam, bidding and making 7NT (2220 points). Phil says that some intelligent guesswork was involved.


The Coffs Harbour newsletter suggested a second bid of 5NT to show 31-32 HCP, based on Ron Klinger (p66 – Guide to Better Duplicate Bridge). This, however, was a description of a Benjamin 2♦ opening and negative 2♥ response. The logic is impeccable; 5NT is invitational to slam, and with 4 HCP, North should at least bid 6NT.

As to the play, East is squeezed with 3 rounds of ♠ and then 4 rounds of ♥. Toss a ♠? or a ♦?. South discards whatever East didn't on the fourth heart. 12 tricks are sure; 13 are possible.

2024 ANC

The Australian National Championships for 2024 are now done and dusted. The core event at the ANC is the Interstate Teams, contested in four divisions: Open, Seniors, Women, and Youth.

The ANC might not generate the same excitement as the State of Origin, but it certainly should. NSW teams won three divisions (Open, Seniors' and Women's).

For those who didn't follow the tournament, the qualifying stage involves 14 matches (two complete round robins) of 16 boards each. The top two teams then play five sets of 12 boards.

The Women's event provided a nail-biting finish. Going into the last set in the Women's, South Australia led by 1.5 IMPs. SA got up to a 13 IMP lead three times in the set, but heading into the last board, they led by two.

At the other table, 4\,\text{\Phi} by NSW made with an overtrick.

Morgan-King for South Australia could bid 5♠ or double 5♥. Instead, she chose to pass, scoring only +200. 6 IMPs to NSW, who won by 4 IMPs.

ABF Fee increases

The ABF has announced an increase in capitation fees over the next three years and an increase in masterpoints fees for 2025 as follows:

ABF Capitation Fee Increases for 2025, 2026, and 2027

In brief, these fee increases are important to enable the ABF to continue to develop the MYABF platform to support all bridge clubs across Australia. MYABF is already used by many bridge clubs in Australia for administrative tasks and is the envy of other countries. Further development will ensure that it can offer additional options to reduce the time and effort required to manage a more complete range of bridge club tasks.

More information on these fee increases is available on the ABF website.

We understand that for some of our member clubs who saw this communication, increased fees became the headline issue and of great concern. We hope this early advice allows clubs to plan for these increases in 2025. The Bridge NSW capitation fee remains \$20 for 2025. These ABF fees and NSW

affiliation fees are completely covered at a bit over \$1 per week per member player.

The benefits of affiliation with the ABF – accessed through being a member or associated club of Bridge NSW – are considerable. The public liability and volunteer worker insurance through the ABF and access to ABF travel insurance and other club insurance are huge benefits. The masterpoints system allows events tailored to player skill and experience to be organised nationwide.

MyABF aims to ensure all bridge clubs have a reliable and up-to-date technology platform that reduces the administrative workload usually done by committed volunteers. Bridge NSW commends the usage of MyABF to all clubs. If you are not utilising all its capabilities, please plan to learn more and progress to this platform.

Technology platforms widely used in the bridge world may not be well supported in the coming years. MyABF plans to ensure a national platform so that no bridge club is left without suitable technology to administer their club, no matter how small that club is.

The ABF has asked us to advise all clubs that they have renewed the personal accident insurance policy covering voluntary workers at clubs. Details are available on the ABF website and the certificate of currency will be updated soon.

The new policy has an age limit of 95 – so club members over 95 are no longer covered **when acting as volunteers**. (They are still covered when playing bridge!)



Fancy editing the news-letter?

What do we mean by "editing?" Editors plan, coordinate, and revise material for publication.

We are putting together an editorial team for our publication – which we aim to issue monthly, but it may be bimonthly. That depends a bit on the editorial team. Is bridge a sport?

Bridge is internationally recognised as a mind sport, and the World Bridge Federation is one of the International Olympic Committee's "recognised international federations". It wasn't included in the program for Paris 2024, though.

Bridge NSW isn't a recognised State Sporting Organisation, and we cannot be unless the Australian Bridge Federation (ABF) is a recognised National Sporting Organisation. The ABF has had a previous application rejected. However, I think many would agree that bridge is more worthy of recognition than billiards and snooker, or eight ball (pool) which are on the list.

It is a pity that we aren't recognised, not least because it excludes us from some grant programs. It also means we aren't considered when the ASC develops some of its excellent content. That includes "officiating" programs designed for both community and advanced levels.

The good news is that the ABF is taking another run at getting itself recognised as a National Sports Organisation.

Your Guide to the Sydney Spring Nationals

This year, the Sydney Spring Nationals are being held over nine days rather than seven, providing competitions on two weekends as well as the intervening days. The competitions available are fairly easily described and are clearly shown in the graphic from the MyABF entry for the event.

It kicks off on Saturday, 19 October, with the Spring Nationals Mixed Teams. Qualifying takes place on Saturday and Sunday, with semi-finals and finals on the next two days. The Gerda Stern Mixed Pairs event will suit pairs that don't make the finals and is also available for direct entry.

The alternative event on the opening weekend is the Penline Butler Swiss Pairs, which is intended to have four divisions: Open, Intermediate (below 750 masterpoints), Restricted (below 300) and Novice (below 100).

Penline, TBIB, Bridgear and TMAAT are the sponsors' names; they don't describe the contest.

The next block of events starts on Wednesday with the TBIB Open Teams Qualifying. This is one event that will generate the field for three finals events: Open, Seniors' and Women's.

Also, starting on Wednesday, there will be Intermediate and Restricted Teams events, with a final for the first of these on Friday. Finally. There is another set of pairs events, again in four divisions on the second weekend. These events are all Swiss Matchpoint Pairs of 12 rounds of 10 boards.

Know your events

Teams and Butler Swiss Pairs use IMPs scoring. The Butler system in pairs events removes the top and bottom 10% of scores before calculating the datum for IMPs scoring.

In a Swiss event, the first round is played randomly. In subsequent rounds, pairs (or teams) play those closest to them in aggregate score (in Victory Points).

The ABF uses Playoff Qualifying Points (PQPs) to qualify for Australian Team selection events.
